NMHC Research Forum Recap

Apartment researchers and industry executives gathered in Chicago last week for the [2018 NMHC Research Forum](#) to learn about new housing tools and methodologies, emerging multifamily data trends and new investment opportunities.

In addition to an update on the economic outlook, the program offered an in-depth view of the apartment market as a whole, as well as a deeper dive into some key geographic markets. Interesting discussions were had about the health and future of the Rust Belt, as well as the challenges facing the retail sector.

Several NMHC subject matter experts also shared some new information and data. NMHC's Vice President of Tax Matthew Berger also walked attendees through the ins and outs of the new tax law and its effect on everything from the new tax rates to depreciation schedules, business interest deductibility, carried interest, like-kind exchanges and more. Caitlin Walter, NMHC's senior director of research, shared some of the work on housing density from her recently accepted doctoral dissertation.
